




Welcome to Year 1





Differences between Reception and Year 1


- We try to provide a gentle transition onto the national curriculum.
- The children will still get "choosing time" where they can choose from the different activities in the classroom.
- Within each session each child will be involved in a group or individual activity. At this stage of the year these will be led by an adult.
- Throughout the year the amount of time and independence of the activities will be increased.

Phonics

- Still a big importance on phonics with daily sessions.
- Research tells us that children who are better readers become better writers.
- We try to encourage the children to use their phonic knowledge in their writing.
- How can you help at home?
 - Phonic games (apps, sent home)
 - Mr Thorne does Phonics (google it for clips and apps)

Phonics Check

- All Year 1 children in the country sit the phonics screening check in June.
- 40 words, some real and some alien that the children have to read.
- Children can take breaks during the check and we move at their own individual pace.
- Can sound out words but need to put it back together at the end.



Reading Books

- Your child will be read with at least once every two weeks and books will be changed every week.
- Guided reading will also take place once a week in small groups.
- Each child will take home 2-3 books per week.
- Regular reading at home with your child.
- The new national curriculum is putting much more emphasis on comprehension so it is important to discuss the book with your child as well as just reading the words.
- Could you please fill in your child's reading record to let us know how your child has found the book or what activity you did to do with the book.

Reading Prompts to ask your child during reading

- Look at the cover and title "What do you think might happen in the book?"
- "Is it fiction or a factual book?"
- "What colour was the..."
- "Why do you think the character is happy/sad etc?"
- "Did you like the book? Why?"
- "Can you make up a different ending?"

Reading and Writing at Home

- Sentence ordering games
- Letter formation in mud or icing sugar
- Writing and reading shopping lists
- Making up stories (orally as well as written)
- Read to your child
- Visit your local library
- Rhyming words

Maths

- New whole school maths interventions this year. Children are placed into groups ensuring specific challenge for each child.
- The groups then work on specific targets to learn them off by heart. This will then help with the rest of their maths learning.
- We always try to make our learning as practical as possible.
- Once children are secure with the learning objective emphasis is put on using this with problem solving activities.

Maths

- Ways to help your child with maths at home
 - Counting, reading and writing numbers
 - Board games (snakes and ladders)
 - Pointing out shapes in environment
 - Sharing food equally
 - Looking at clocks
 - Cutting cakes, pizzas etc into halves/quarters
 - Baking for exploring weight and capacity

Foundation Subjects

- Wide and varied curriculum (Science, RE, PE, computing, art, music, design and technology, geography, history)
- We try to allow the children to be as creative as possible.
- Learning is usually topic based (Dinosaurs, Beatrix Potter, Plants, Seaside etc)

Routines

- Names on board in the morning depending on what is happening at home time.
- Try to move away from the bus and club tags to promote independence.
- No orange home-school books now, if you have something to send into school please get your child to give it to us in the morning.
- We encourage all children to get changed for PE independently so we ask that you help us with this at home as well.
